Martin Rinehart and Kathi Wright, with Thomas County Emergency Medical Services, gave the report, which included the number of runs over the past four years and how they compare.

For example, from January to September of 2002, there were 486 ambulance runs compared to 577 through the same time period this year, a difference of 91.

Commissioner Ron Evans asked how much the base price for an ambulance transport is. Rinehart said it's \$230 and \$7.50 a mile, either in or out of the county.
