HAYS (AP) — A judge set bond Smithville, Texas; Luis Llamas, 23, at \$1 million Thursday for two Fort Hays State University football players and a third man arrested in the death of another student.

# Council gets a look at new law enforcement center

Free Press Editor The Colby City Council toured the new law enforcement center at 360 N. Franklin prior to its meeting Tuesday night.

Police Chief Randy Jones pointed out various locations within the building for classroom work, training exercises and records keeping for both the police and other city

Currently, many of the police records are stored at the old hospital where the school district's administration building is located until their new building is completed. The new training center was for-
