He was selling from Spain, but only once did I question him about possible problems. What an expert he was at saying the things I wanted to hear about his online accolades and e-mail references.


I even apologized for implying that he might be capable of wrongdoing. Well, my money is gone. The escrow and good reviews were fake. The issue is "being investigated."






