Brewster man charged with first-degree murder

Free Press Editor GOODLAND — A 33-year-old Brewster man appeared today before the Sherman County District Court on charges of the shooting death of his 27-year-old wife early Sunday morning.

Lanny Bevington was arrested Monday and a \$1 million bond was set in the alleged murder of Kerrie A. Bevington, said Sherman County Sheriff Doug Whitson.

In the initial investigation, Whitson said first degree murder in what authorities are the husband claimed the shooting was acnow saying was not an accident involving cidental, but suspicion was cast on Lanny after KBI agents looked further into the incident.

Prior to the shooting, the couple was apparently at a wedding dance in Colby and left the party sometime after 2 a.m.

Authorities said the time of death was between 3 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday morning, but the body was not discovered until 7 a.m. when Lanny called Kerrie's father, Tom Aschenbrenner.
