# Charter school clears first of many hurdles

Colby Free Press A charter school for Colby moved one step closer to reality during the school board meeting Monday night when the board approved a petition for the school.

District Curriculum Director Diana Wieland presented the peti-

Wieland said the board wasn't approving the charter school itself, only the petition that will be submitted to the state for final approval.

Wieland said the petition will now be reviewed by a committee and if accepted, will go to the state board of education for their approval. If the state board approves, it will come back to Colby and the school district can proceed or stop the process if they choose.

Wieland said the federal funding is for three years only but once the public hearing on the charter school school gets students enrolled, it will receive funding from the state for each student attending the school.

She said if a student is spending half a day at charter school and the other half at regular school, that money, \$3,863 would be split between the schools.

Free Press Editor The Colby City Council decided it will not close the exit on the access road north of E. 4th St. at County Club Drive—in part due to information provided by one business owner at the council meeting Tuesday night.

Jane Johnson, agent with State Farm Insurance, said she was "very concerned" about the closure and explained many of those reasons to the council.

### iscussion on a new track at Dennen Field continues

Colby Free Press A new surface for the track at Dennen Field continues to find its way into Colby School Board discussions, the latest coming Monday

Superintendent Kirk Nielsen said they could do bids in May and have the work done this summer.

School board president Stan Molstad suggested taking bids by the beginning of March; however, Nielsen said nothing has been decided yet.

The board heard presentations on resurfacing the track from four companies back in November, which was the beginning of the discussion. There are concerns about

the track because the latex is eroding in several places but the surface has lasted longer than expected. The surface currently on the track was laid in 1989.

Nielsen said they are going to put specifications together and see what potential bids come in at.

There are two choices for a new surface — latex and polyurethane.

He said the school district has funds to help resurface the track, but they won't find out until February or March if the district will receive one of the grants.

Nielsen said the district would have to match the grant, which could be up to \$50,000 to put toward a polyurethane surface.

"They're going to let us know applied for a grant from Nike to get soon," he said. Nielsen said time constraints and cost are two concerns, since the district would like work to be completed this summer, if possible. He said cost is another matter because the board will have to choose between a latex surface, which is cheaper, and polyurethane, though expensive, lasts longer.
