

1. Four notrump. Partner's four-heart bid, in conjunction with his two-club response, is slam invitational. It indicates values greater than a jump to three hearts (forcing) would show. So, even though you have only 14 high-card points and no aces, you should accept partner's invitation and bid again. The key to the slam, if there is one, is how many aces he has — and that is why your best bet at this point is Blackwood. If partner turns up with three aces, you're virtually certain to make a slam.

2. Three hearts. It is often said that a partnership requires 33 points for a small slam, but while this is generally true for balanced hands, it is an inaccurate way of assessing the potential for slam on unbalanced hands. In actuality, most slams are made with hands that contain only about 28 to 30 high-card points. The chief reason these hands produce 12 tricks is that they contain distributional features that neutralize most of the 10 to 12 high-card points held by the defenders.

Consider this case where you have only 12 highcard points and partner, after opening one club, raises you to two spades. It would be wrong to jump directly to four spades on the basis that partner has a minimum opening bid and so have you — which usually means there's no slam.

However, suppose partner held: [S] Q874 [H] K6 [D] A85 [C] KQ52 [S] Q863 [H] 5 [D] A82 [C] AQ743

In both cases your side belongs in a slam, and the best way to start the ball rolling in that direction is by bidding three hearts over two spades. With either hand shown, partner should cooperate with your slam try by bidding four diamonds. This shows the ace of diamonds, a good holding opposite a second-

ary heart suit, and a hand that is better than an aver-

age two-spade raise. With partner showing these

plus features, you could either immediately or sub-

sequently contract for six spades. If your partner instead held something like [S] QJ64 [H] 852 [D] A8 [C] KQ102, he would make the discouraging response of three spades, and you would then close the auction by bidding four spades.

Sneak Attack

When fate neglects to give declarer enough assets to work with, he can sometimes try to enlist the aid of his opponents to achieve his goal. This usually requires a smooth performance by declarer, and a good example is provided in today's deal.

West led a diamond against six hearts, and South saw at once that the slam would fail unless he could avoid losing two club tricks.

Since there were very few holdings the defenders could have that would permit only one club loser (K-Q doubleton or the singleton king or queen with West, for example), South decided to add to his chances by giving the defenders a chance to go

Accordingly, at trick two he led a club to the ace, both opponents following low. He then cashed the ace of spades, A-K of trumps and K-Q of spades, discarding two diamonds from dummy. After ruffing

his last spade in dummy, the stage was set. With fingers crossed, declarer led a club. East won with the king but had to return a diamond, whereupon South discarded the jack of clubs as he ruffed in dummy to bring in the slam.

The key play occurred at trick two when declarer led a club to the ace. East could have assured defeat of the slam by dropping the king under the ace, but he was hardly in a position to find this defense

so early in the play. Had declarer telegraphed his intentions by first stripping his own hand and dummy of spades and diamonds before cashing the ace of clubs, it would have been much easier for East to dispose of his king under the ace. West would then have been able to

score two club tricks to set the slam. To have the greatest chance of success, declarer's club play had to be made before East realized that the king was a hot potato.
