The Kansas Basketball Coaches Association has Colby at #3 in its final regular season poll.

Colby outscored Atwood in all four quarters, 14-10 in the first, 16-12 in the second, 22-13 in the third and 18-8 in the final period.

The Colby Community College 33-29 with 16:09 remaining. The Lady Trojans continued their dominance of Jayhawk West Conference opponents rolling to a 56-44 victory at the Community Building behind a suffocating defensive effort. The Trojans won their 25th game of the season, surpassing the previous school record of 24.

Colby jumped out to a 7-1 start and only trailed once in the game. The Trojans was down for the only time 10-9 with 6:38 left in the opening period, but rallied with a 7-0 run that spanned two minutes to take the

Irojan men fall to Hutchinson

at 2,200 at the Colby Community Building Saturday night, #11ranked Hutchinson made their final run count in defeating the #13ranked Colby Community College Trojan men, 84-72, ending Colby's school record 18-game home court winning streak.

With 4:02 remaining in the game and the score tied at 68, Hutchinson's Durrall Peterson hit a tough jumper to spark the Blue Dragons to a 16-4 run to end the game which saw several runs by each team.

Hutchinson opened the game with a 14-4 run in the first 6 minutes of the contest before Colby countered. The Trojans responded with a 18-6 run to take their first lead of the game at 22-20 with 9:52 remaining in the opening period.

The lead would see-saw much of the rest of the first half before Hutchinson ended the period with

a 9-5 run to lead 45-41 at the break. Colby scored the first 7 points of the second half before Hutchinson rallied. With the Trojans leading 50-48 with just under 18 minutes to play, Hutchinson would make a 16-5 run to lead by 9 with 8:32 remain-

ing. Colby answered the bell again

Before a record crowd estimated as they would outscored Hutchinson 13-4 to tie the game at 68 with 4:02 left.

Colby shot just 37.3 percent from the field and was held to just 9 of 30 (30 percent) from beyond the 3point arc. The Trojans also shot a dismal 13 of 23 (56.5 percent) from the free throw line. Hutchinson dominated the glass outrebounding the Trojans 51-29. Colby came into the game as the top rebounding team in Region VI.

Branden Miller scored 20 points and dished out 4 assists to lead the Trojans. EJ Drayton scored 16 points and grabbed 6 rebounds, but was held to just 6 of 17 shooting. Dillion Sneed scored 8 points and grabbed a team high 10 rebounds. The Trojans committed a season low 5 turnovers.

Colby is now 23-5 overall and 9-5 in Jayhawk West Conference action. They will host Dodge City Wednesday at the Community Building. Game time is set for 8
