Lady Eagles win again; top seed in sub-state

Free Press Contributor The Colby Lady Eagles concluded their regular season with a 50-42 win on the road against the Norton Blue Jays. The Eagles head into 4A sub-state play with a 19-1 record and the #1 seed. They will take on Ulysses in the Community Building at 7 p.m. on Monday.

At Norton, the host Blue Jays outscored the Eagles in the first period, 15-9 and both teams put up 9 points in the second with the Jays leading 24-18 at the break. The Eagles came out strong in the third

quarter and closed the gap to within blocked 17 in the final period while holding Norton to just 6.

Amanda Seemann led the Eagles with 12 points, 2 rebounds, 1 steal and 3 assists. Jessica Stephens followed with 11 points, 4 rebounds, 3 steals and 1 assist. Emily Sloan and Ashley Barnes both added 10 points and Sloan had 7 rebounds and blocked 1 shot and Barnes had 5 rebounds and 2 steals. Ivy Ramsey connected on 7 of 10 charity tosses and finished with 7 points, 3 rebounds, 1 steal, 5 assists and 2

shots. Brittany 3 points (36-33) and added another Kersenbrock had 1 assist, and Zanae Baird and Marcia Kaus also saw action.

The Eagles committed just 7 turnovers, but were outrebounded 37-20. They shot 38 percent from the field and 33 percent from behind the arc. They were 57 percent at the free throw line.


