Mary Lahman took a fall last Monday and was taken to the hospital for tests. Thankfully no bones were broken but she will be having therapy for a time before returning home.



Joanne Kay (Stover) Stone passed away March 7, 2004, from complications of lupus. Joanne was born December 5, 1941, in Hutchinson. Kansas, the daughter of Gerald and Thais Stover. She grew up in Colby, Kansas, where she graduated from high school in 1959. As a teenager, she was active in Kayettes, which she served as an officer, Future Homemakers of America, Glee Club, and band, in which she played the saxophone. She was also a class officer and helped initiate the Future Teachers of America Club at Colby High School. Her college preparatory curriculum led to a Watkins Scholarship at the University of Kansas. She also held a U.G. Mitchell Scholarship and was selected for membership in Pi Mu Epsilon, a math honor society. Graduating Phi Beta Kappa, she received degrees in German and math-

ematics in 1963. During her time at K.U. she was a member of Chi Omega, which she served as president her senior year. She was also named to the Owens Honor Society as a sophomore, served on the University Senate Board of Standards, was a representative to All Women Students, and was vice-president of Mortarboard. In recognition of her outstanding record of academics and activities, she was named a Hilltopper by the Jayhawker yearbook staff.

After graduation, she worked as a computer programmer for IBM and then the Shawnee Mission public schools. Subsequently, she was employed as a systems analyst for Flight Planning at TWA/American Airlines, a position she loved and held for twenty-two years. During that time, she was honored on several occasion for outstanding contributions to the company, including the TWA award of Excellence (1982, 1997) and special recognition from Flight Operations in 1996 This position also fostered her love of travel and led to lifelong friendships. She retired from the airline in 2002.

Joanne's activities in the Kansas City community revolved around her church Rolling Hills Presbyterian, where she served as a deacon, circle leader, and choir and book club member. She was also a former president of Chapter FV of the P.E.O. sisterhood and was treasurer at the time of her death. As an advocate for lupus research and support, she served on the board of the Kansas City of the Lupus Foundation of America and worked tirelessly to assist other lupus patients. Other organizations which benefited from Joanne's talents and time included the Junior League of Kansas City, Missouri and the Chi Omega Alumnae Club. Joanne loved traveling with family and friends to places all around the world. She also enjoyed scrapbooking her trips, sewing, gardening, and sharing stories with her grandsons -- especially tales of tornadoes in western Kansas. She was a lifelong avid Jayhawk fan and attended both football and basketball games for many years. Joanne's family included her late husband of 39 years, S. Terrence Stone, who passed away last March, and their two daughters, Sara and Lisa. Sara and her husband, Keith Harrison, live in San Diego with sons Brendon and Carter. Lisa and her husband, Patrick Butler, reside in Olathe with their sons Jackson and Samuel. Joanne is also survived by her mother-in-law, Esther Stone, of Prairie Village; a sister, Carol McWilliams, of Shaker Heights, Ohio; and a brother, John Stover, of Lawrence.
