Gardeners win when weeds lose, expert says

win-win situation ^ except, of course, for the weeds.

The person doing the weeding wins because research has found gardening can be one of the best allround exercises, promoting stamina, strength, flexibility, stress relief and even a more positive attitude. At the same time, weeders can set their own pace, as well as use adapted tools to counter many physical disabilities, said Chuck get the job done by lightly scraping Marr, horticulturist with Kansas State University Research and Extension

Weeding loosens the soil, too, allowing for improved air circulation and moisture penetration.

"Naturally, it also reduces your ornamental and vegetable plants' competition for water, nutrients, oxygen, root space and sometimes sunlight," Marr said.

As a control, however, the task generally is most effective if done while the weeds are small.

"The temptation is to put off weeding, telling yourself your only real deadline is to get them out before they go to seed and produce more weeds," he said. "In the meantime, though, some will be growing a long taproot from which they can resprout again and again. Besides, given a few days of warm weather

MANHATTAN — Weeding is a and adequate moisture, weeds can mature amazingly fast, becoming much more difficult to remove."


Beyond that, many perennial flowers and vegetable crops have roots near the soil surface.

"You can't go in and till right next to them. You could damage their roots by hand-digging out a single large, well-established dandelion," Marr said. "But if you use care and the weeds are small, you usually can the soil surface with a hoe.


