switching to fiction, Greg Iles, author of eight best sellers, takes the paranoid thriller to new heights in his latest book called *The Footprints of God*. Physician and ethicist Dr. David Tennant has been working on a secret government project called Trinity that strives to build a supercomputer b liberating human intelligence from the human body. As you might expect, things do not go well. His ethical concerns increase when members of the Trinity team begin to develop neurological disorders. He seeks psychiatric help from his naturally beautiful psychiatrist who is then drawn into the arena of whether or not the good doctor is paranoid or insightful. The story moves quickly and keeps the suspense running high.

Finally, what would you do if you were a psychologist and a patient burst into your office claiming that her husband was a serial murderer? That is the problem that Dr. Alan Gregory has as the new novel by Stephen White called *Blinded* begins. The woman claims her husband murdered someone she was having an affair with, but it doesn't end there. She also claims that there

are dead women all across the country who died by his hand as well. Gregory enlists his lawyer wife and a friendly policeman to help him grapple with the questions of legal privilege involved. What can he tell the authorities without violating the doctor-patient confidentiality? Can this woman actually testify against her husband in court? White has a track record for high-octane psychological thrillers that always have more than one level of deceit operating within. *Blinded* certainly carries this tradition on superbly.
