"We can hope for average," Aiken said. "That's probably the best we can hope for. That's my expectations."

It also enhances the chances for summer crops and lessens the threat of wind and erosion, he said.

Another advantage, he said, is that rain this time of year helps build back up soil moisture, which crops will need this summer.

"This is like money in the bank for improving yield potential," he

Aiken said the fields at the experiment station are testing back with results of about an inch and a half of available soil moisture.
