The horrific treatment of Iraqi prisoners of war by American military personnel goes beyond troubling. It's sick. And the photos showing smiling Americans as though these are acts proudly proclaimed leave little wiggle room when it comes to applying whatever punishment is handed out.

We only hope it isn't some non-commissioned officer that eventually becomes the scapegoat. This goes up much higher on the chain of command.

There is much finger pointing going on, especially among those with commissioned status. And the general in charge of the 16 prisons failed to make a compelling case when she allowed herself to be interviewed on television this week.

We guess if heads are to roll, they have to start with those wearing stars on their shoulders. After all those are the class of military people who come in for all the praise and glory when success is proclaimed. Now, with this utterly disgusting turn of events, they must share the burden, the

Donald Rumsfeld, secretary of defense, is appearing before a bunch of unhappy campers — senators and representatives — as this is being written this morning. It won't be a cordial stage on which he will perform. A grilling of unheard magnitude is promised.

Should he resign? Democrats on Capitol Hill are generally in agreement that he should. Republicans on Capitol Hill are silent. This is an election year and the path to the White House is being riddled by several weighty issues. Prison torture is just the latest. Unfortunately, this ordeal will become a campaign issue, instead of a matter of justice being rendered in an unjust circumstance.

Mother's Day Trivia

• The youngest mother whose history is authenticated is Lina Medina, who delivered a 6pound boy by cesarean section in Lima, Peru in 1939, at an age of 5 years and 7 months. The child was raised as her brother and only discovered that Lina was his mother when he was 10.

• Bobbie McCaughey is the mother who holds the record for the most surviving children from a single birth. She gave birth to the first set of surviving septuplets — four boys and three girls on November 19, 1997, at the University Hospital, Iowa. Conceived by in vitro fertilization, the babies were delivered after 31 weeks by caesarean in the space of 16 minutes.

• Jayne Bleackley is the mother who holds the record for the shortest interval between two children born in separate confinements. She gave birth to Joseph Robert on September 3, 1999, and Annie Jessica Joyce on March 30, 2000. The babies were born 208 days apart.

• Elizabeth Ann Buttle is the mother who holds the record for the longest interval between the birth of two children. She gave birth to Belinda on May 19,1956 and Joseph on November 20, 1997. The babies were born 41 years 185 days apart. The mother was 60 years old when her son Joseph was born.

• The highest officially recorded number of children born to one mother is 69, to the first wife of Feodor Vassilyev (1707-1782) of Shuya, Russia, Between 1725 and 1765, in a total of 27 confinements, she gave birth to 16 pairs of twins, seven sets of triplets, and four sets of quadruplets. 67 of them survived infancy.

• The modern world record for giving birth is held by Leontina Albina from San Antonio, Chile. Leontina claims to be the mother of 64 children, of which only 55 of them are documented. She is listed in the 1999 Guinness World Records but dropped from later editions.
