Governor 'fairly confident' schools will be open in fall, keeping options open

Associated Press Writer TOPEKA (AP)—Gov. Kathleen Sebelius says classes will be in session this fall when the new school year begins, despite a judge's order to close the state's schools at the end of next month.

"We're fairly confident the Supreme Court will allow schools to remain open as it reviews this complicated and extraordinary case," Sebelius said Thursday.

At issue is a final order issued Tuesday by Shawnee County Dis-

dered schools closed effective July 1 until legislators fix what he has ruled are constitutional flaws in the state's school finance system.

The state filed an emergency motion seeking a stay of Bullock's order, which would prevent schools from closing. The Kansas Supreme Court will rule on the motion within two weeks.

The earlier preliminary ruling from Bullock, which held the finance system unconstitutional, has already been appealed to the Kan-

Sebelius said one possibility would be for legislative committees to begin their work on a new system late in 2004 before the full Legislature returns in January 2005 for its 90-day session.

Also Thursday, attorneys for the state and the State Board of Education received an extension for filing written arguments with the Supreme Court in the original appeal, which was filed in March. Similar documents will be due later from Alan Rupe, attorney for the Salina and Dodge City school districts, which sued the state in 1999.

Bullock's Tuesday decision came three days after legislators adjourned the 2004 session without acting on his December order to fix the school finance system.

Bullock said in that preliminary ruling the system for distributing \$2.77 billion in state aid is unconstitutional partly because of how it distributes money to programs for poor and minority students. He also found the existing level of funding to be inadequate because the Kansas Constitution requires "suitable provision" for funding schools.

Bullock wanted legislators to change the system during their 2004 session, setting a deadline of July 1 to make his order final. Legislators responded by passing a law allowing the state to immediately appeal the preliminary order to the Kansas Supreme Court

"I think there's little doubt the Legislature's failure to act on a school finance plan will mean there's pain felt around the state," said Sebelius, adding that school districts will be forced to cut programs, staff and services.
