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Library latest target

Vandals destroyed a limestone marker and caused major damage to a water fountain in front of Pioneer Memorial Library in Colby either late Wednesday night or early this morning, said Gary Shull, Colby police investigator.

The first to notice the damage was Officer Tom Nickols who was patrolling the area and saw the fountain at 3:49 a.m. today,

Nickols said in his report that he noticed the fountain was leaning and in making a closer inspection saw the shattered donation

The donation stone was a gift to the library and initiated by Dick Weston, who was involved with the VFW and did much to educate the public about the use and care of the American flag. The stone, library staff mem-

bers said, had the names of the people who donated money, time and materials to place the flag and flag pole in front of the library.

Jeff Friesen, who recently replaced JoAnne Sunderman as the new librarian, along with other Pioneer Memorial Library employees, said they thought the incident was senseless.

"I think it is very, very sad that one or two people decided to destroy a creation that was important not just to the library, but to the whole community," he said.

"I hope that whoever did this will feel the need to make things right before they are caught."

Sunderman, who officially retired from the library on Wednesday, had said in a previous article that the fountain was designed original building opened.

At that time, she said it is still virtually the same design today although it has gone through a number of new pumps and face lifts over the years — not to mention soapings.

Prior to her retirement, the fountain had been assessed by someone who said it would need it."





Five dead in latest construction zone crash

PEABODY (AP) — Locals in this small town north of Wichita say most families own a police scanner. They know when something's gone wrong on U.S. 50, and they almost all know someone who has died or been hurt in an accident on the road-

Wednesday, the people of Peabody again had to come to grips with a highway tragedy: A six-car accident claimed five lives Tuesday night, a day after a similar collision left two dead at the same location. died along the construction zone near the central Kansas community of 1,500 residents.

"It shook me. I almost threw up from what I heard," said Solomon Nawiseh, who works at a convenience store in Peabody.
