

Speedway features action on the track, in the sky

County speedway on Sunday night in Colby were treated to a belated fireworks display put on by the Colby Kiwanis Club and the Colby Fire Department. The fireworks had been postponed due to rain on July 4. They finally got the fireworks set off following a great night of racing, as the improvements to the track seem to keep getting better. Drivers were running from the top to the bottom on Sunday night.

The Cruiser class was the first feature of the evening and was dominated by the 00 car of Haines/ Allenbaugh. They led lap one and never looked back. Vrbas/Vrbas ran the entire race in the number two spot but had constant pressure from Honeyman/Dirks, who made a hard charge for the position late in the race but ran out of laps before getting the job done. The Trojan wrestling team's GPA of 3.12 was the best in the nation for the second straight season. The women's basketball team finished the season with a 3.60 GPA, which put them in second place nationally, three places ahead of their finish last season.

Also improving on last years finish was Trojan baseball, which earned second nationally with a 3.30 team GPA, four places ahead of their 2003 season. This was Trojan baseball's sixth season in a row with a team GPA above 3.0.
