ATHENS, Greece (AP)—Justin Gatlin ran the race of his life, barely holding off the field to win the 100 meters in 9.85 seconds.

Francis Obikwelu of Portugal got the silver in 9.86 and defending champion Maurice Greene won bronze in 9.87. A third American, Shawn Crawford, was fourth in

Five runners broke the 10-second mark, and another — world champion Kim Collins — finished in exactly 10 seconds.

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Nicolas Massu won his second gold of these Olympics, beating American Mardy Fish 6-3, 3-6, 2-6, 6-3, 6-4 in an error-strewn men's singles final that went four hours.

Chile had never won a gold medal in any sport until Massu and Fernando Gonzalez won the doubles title in a match that lasted more than 3 1/2 hours and ended in the wee hours.

Gonzalez won the singles bronze, beating Taylor Dent of the United States.

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — Stewart Cink closed with an even-par 70 to beat Tiger Woods and Rory Sabbatini by four strokes at the NEC Invitational, becoming the first wire-to-wire winner on the PGA Tour this year.

Cink made a 15-foot birdie putt on 18 to finish at 11-under 269. He earned \$1.2 million, the largest payoff of his career.

Sabbatini make a 20-foot birdie on the 14th hole to trail by two shots, but bogeyed two of the next three holes for a 68.

Woods finished with a rare birdie for a 69, and continued his streak of never finishing worse than fifth at Firestone.
