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Accidents, injuries reported

Overcorrecting or losing control contributed to three one-vehicle accidents in Thomas County during the first part of September.

The most recent accidents happened on Labor Day with the first reported at 12:14 p.m. on Interstate 70 by the Kansas Highway Patrol.

Traveling in the westbound lane, a 2002 Chevrolet truck driven by Andrew K. Choate, 37, of Gore, Okla., lost control and overturned the truck into the median about 11 miles west of Colby.

In addition to the driver being injured, four other passengers were taken to Citizens Medical Center in Colby with possible injuries. Those included Gail R. Choate, 34; Trent Choate, 13; Taylor Choate, 11; and Seth C. Roberts, 14, all of Gore,

Patrol officials said the driver. along with three other passengers were wearing seatbelts; however, Trent and Roberts, were not.

All were treated and released. Later on Labor Day afternoon, a second accident in Thomas County involved a 2005 Yamaha motorcycle driven by Lawrence T. Murphy, 42, of Glastonbury, Conn. According to the police report, Murphy was diabetic and apparently lost control of the motorcycle while westbound on Interstate 70 about one mile west of Brewster at 3:15 p.m.

Murphy was taken by Thomas County Emergency Medical Services to Citizens Medical Center where he was later lifeflighted to Swedish Hospital in Denver. No condition report was available. Damage in both accidents was unknown, patrol officials said.

In the third mishap, which occurred last Sunday, Kristin Renee Theimer, 17, of Colby was injured when her 1999 Oldsmobile Alero overturned about six miles south of Colby on Kansas Highway 25 going north.



Hines presented the profit/loss statement for the year to date. She said the net loss is \$7,490 and total income for the year, including advertising and all of the fair events, was \$130,000 and the actual expenses are \$137,400.

She said the increase was because utilities are higher this year and the expenses for the barbecue went up slightly. Another reason, Hines said, was the improvements made to the fairgrounds, including new siding on three barns and new campsite hookups.
