Downing said she's excited about her new position and has had a great teacher in Tubbs.



The hours for Santa City are Saturday and Sunday from 1 to 5 p.m. and beginning Monday, Dec. 13, from 6 to 8 p.m. weekdays until Christmas Eve. On that day, Santa will talk with children from 1 to 3 p.m.

No matter what avenue children choose to send their requests to Santa, he said he is confident that he and his helpers will get everything done in time for Christmas.
