## **Parade** winners announced

Businesses, organizations, families, pets and more were out in full force Sunday night during the annual Colby Christmas Parade downtown.

It was a tough decision, but the judges came up with their choice for first and second place in six

First National Bank with its "Shrek" theme took first place in the Best Lit category followed in second place by Lon Sowers and his "lighted nosed" oxen. In the organizational category, the Girl Scouts took first and Toys for Tots was second.

Business entries saw Colby Ag in first and Lang Diesel second, along with Matt Lindberg and the Quagliano children taking first and second respectively in the Youth category.

The Knights of Columbus with the theme of keeping "Christ" in Christmas won first place in religious theme and Dale Deaver, representing the VFW won first place in Patriotic. Now in its seventh year, said Jada Tubbs, executive director of the Colby/ Thomas County Chamber of Commerce, the parade started off at the TNT Auction building and ended at Santa City.

The parade, she said, began with the National Guard in Colby's Detachment 2, 170th Maintenance Division and was fol $lowed\,by\,Santa\,and\,Mrs.\,Claus\,in$ Jim Brown's 1974 restored Cadillac El Dorado.

Among the many floats and other lighted displays, Ashlee Haines and her Tumbleweed Tumblers made their way up the street on a tractor-trailer combo with many of the children doing cartwheels and roundhouses along the way, Tubbs said.

Lindberg, one of the winners in the youth category was on a three-wheeler pulling a small float behind him as the Quagliano children rode pedal carts and the Plumisto children either walked or were on a lawn mower.


