Dear Attorney General Kline: Recently I made a deal over the phone to buy a used car from a man. We agreed on a price, he faxed me a notarized contract of sale and made arrangements for the delivery

I wired him \$500 earnest money but I have not been able to reach him since then. Is there anything I can do to get my money back?

Dear Kansas Consumer:

Unfortunately, it is very unlikely that your money can be retrieved. Sending money by wire has advantages in several situations but you must remember it is like handing over cash and there are fewer safeguards, especially when you're buying something basically sight unseen from a person you do not know personally.

Using a check or credit card is much more secure when making purchases of any kind.

impulse — take the time to fully understand all terms of the sale.

Ask the owner or dealer for complete vehicle and title histories, have the vehicle inspected by a trusted mechanic of your choice, and question previous owners about the vehicle and the extent of any prior damage or mechanical problems. If you're offered extended warranties, examine them carefully and remember they are optional, not mandatory.

Finally, remember that it is always sound advice to know the company or, in this case, individual you're doing business with before parting with any of your hard earned money.

Disaster status okayed in 32 counties

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush declared disaster status on Wednesday for 32 Kansas counties hardest hit by last month's ice storm that left hundreds of thousands of people without electrical

Bush acted on the request from sought the federal assistance for the counties that were among the 56 for which she declared a disaster emergency on Jan. 4.

The counties are Anderson, Atchison, Barber, Butler, Chase, Chautauqua, Clark, Coffey, Comanche, Cowley, Crawford, Douglas, Elk, Franklin, Greenwood, Harper, Harvey, Jefferson, Kingman, Lyon, Marion, Morris, Osage, Pratt, Reno, Rice, Sedgwick, Shawnee, Sumner, Wabaunsee, Woodson and Wyandotte.

The president's declaration covers the period from Jan. 4-6. It makes federal funds available, on a cost-sharing basis, to the state, local governments and some non-

profit organizations within the hardhit by power outages related to counties for emergency work and the storm. The state's largest utility, the repair and replacement of facilities damaged by the storm. It includes the cost for dealing with such things as downed power lines and poles, and debris removal.


