
"They bought sleds, coats and more — spending almost \$2,000," Yost said.

Colby hospital hires new nurse anesthetist



Many factors contributed to accident

Baughn said on Tuesday a story in the Colby Free Press on Monday only listed one factor which could have contributed to an accident which killed Jordan Harris, 20years-old.

Baughn said he told the paper there may have been several factors, including speed, alcohol and "freshly laid sand."

The article listed only the sand as a contributing factor.

"I never used the word mitigating, and I said alcohol was involved, but I could not say whether the driver was drinking. I must have said something about sand, but they were on a private road and they were trespassing," he said.

"It was only my personal assess-Thomas County Sheriff Mike ment since I'm not the investigation officer, but speed and alcohol were factors most contributory to the accident, again, in my estimation.

"The road should not be a consideration, as, since it was on private property. If there was no road, an 80-foot pit, or sand dunes, that, in my estimation, is immaterial," he

Harris, along with his three passengers, Tanner Brown, 20, and Steve Young, 20, both of Colby, and Tyler Baker, 20, Fort Collins, Colo., were traveling in a 1996 Chevy Blazer and were westbound on a private road east of Colby when Harris lost control of the sport utility vehicle.

Harris died as a result of his injuries, according to authorities, and

Baughn said the preliminary report of the investigating officer says the officer's opinion of apparent contributing circumstances is that Harris was driving too fast for the conditions of the roadway. And, he said the road was clearly marked with a no trespassing sign.

"I can safely say alcohol was present, but he may have been the designated driver for all we know at this point," he said.

Baughn said it's time the public gets serious about cracking down on underage drinking.

"Until adults get serious about cracking down on the 'socially acceptable' use of alcohol in our rural culture, the question of whether accidents will take the lives of more of our young people is not if they will occur, but only just a matter of when (they will occur).

"Those underage persons had to get the alcohol from someone, but way Patrol, is ongoing.

work together with law enforcement in encouraging cooperation from youth in locating and eliminating the sources of the alcohol," he

Baughn said the accident was a result of choices, albeit bad choices.

"This has been happening for years, and as minors, we were doing the same thing. It's part of our culture and until we change things it's ongoing. Will we ever learn that our choices all have consequences, and that bad choices may result in bad consequences?

"When I see accidents involving alcohol, I always think, 'There, but for the grace of God, go I,"Baughn said. And, he said his "heartfelt sympathy goes out to the Harris family" at this time of their grief.
