

## And now a report from Germany

My Sister Granddaughter Becky Boyd sent the following e-mail on Tuesday Feb. 8. (Becky is serving a two-year mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, now stationed in Stuttgart, Germany. Female missionaries are referred to as 'sister'.) Since I told you about my sea-going fisherman grandson, I will also report on a different kind of adventure.

Liebe Familie und Freunde (Dear Family and Friends):

Yesterday was the Karnevalzug — the parade for the celebration of Karneval. Karneval started on Thursday so as we came home from ZOKO in Duesseldorf, we saw many people in the Hauptbahnhof with their costumes getting ready to celebrate. (Here, that means lots of drinking).

The celebration has gone on until today, with people partying every night. We saw on Thursday and Friday nights a small group of people walking on the street at night in a small parade, banging the drums and singing. As they would come by our house, they would gather more and more people each time they went.

We live on a major street not too far from the center of the city, so we see and hear some things. Last night was the big party night, and we could hear and feel the beat of the Technomusic from the bar across the street from us and also from Innenstadt.

We also heard all of the people laughing and screaming. It was quite infectious, the festive, celebratory spirit here.

We took our Preparation Day for the most part yesterday and went to watch the Zug with the the typical cheap candy, waffles, popcorn, po-

They are such a sweet family and are expecting their second baby. It was so much fun to watch the parade with them and to see everyone else's costumes. It's like Halloween, only four days long and with a lot more beer!

At the parade, everyone scrambled over each other to catch what the people threw out. It was the most random thing. There were floats like we have and people riding on them dressed in costumes, but really no themes and I couldn't tell who was from what organization. But it was so much fun.

And they throw out the most random things, too; it's not like at home where you pick up some cheap lollipops and tootsie rolls. Oh no: they were throwing kleenexes, whole chocolate bars,

tato chips, stuffed animals, other toys.

They handed out little airline bottles of alcohol to the adults, fresh flowers to the women and girls, CDs, records...and Elder Robinson caught a bottle of wine. We ended up with two grocery bags full of stuff. It was unbelievable.

But the work here is going really well, too. We have an Austausch tomorrow, and as it is planned right now, I will go to Duesseldorf and work with Sister Skinner, and Sister Kymalainen will stay here and the Sister Jones will come. It will be really great.

Transfer calls are coming and I don't know what will happen; I have my own desires, but will go where the Lord wants me to be. I do love this work. It is the greatest and hardest work have ever done. I know everyone says that, but it is so true.
