Online system available to report fraud

Fraudulent insurance plans are becoming more prevalent in every line of insurance, and cost consumers billions in unpaid claims. According to the National Insurance Crime Bureau, it is estimated that insurance fraud costs Americans about \$30 billion each year which translates into \$200 - \$300 in higher insurance premiums for the average household. Not only is consumer fraud on the rise, but there is also an increasing number of cases being investigated concerning agent fraud.

As part of the ongoing steps to proactively address issues surrounding insurance fraud, the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC), of which I serve as Secretary-Treasurer, has launched an online insurance fraud reporting system to enable consumers to report suspected acts of insurance fraud. I am very pleased that the NAIC is able to provide this re- date of suspected fraud and amount porting system.

No personal identifying information is required in order to submit an allegation of suspected fraud. The online fraud reporting system allows consumers to provide detailed information anonymously and is available through the Kansas Insurance Department (KID) website at www.ksinsurance.org, or through the NAIC Website www.naic.org.

Complaints received through the online system are then routed out to the appropriate state where reported incidence of fraud may be occurring for full investigation by that state's insurance department.

To file a suspected insurance fraud report, consumers are required to indicate the state where the suspected fraud occurred, name of the business or individual, with a complete mailing address. Other optional fields include the phone appearances in court when necesnumber and date of birth, as well as sary.

In May, 2004, the Kansas Insurance Department created an Anti-Fraud Division whose primary task it is to investigate and, when necessary, prosecute fraudulent insurance acts in the state of Kansas. The division is a law enforcement arm within KID and is directed by a former District Attorney and staffed with attorneys and former law enforcement professionals who apply their experience, training and investigative skills to investigate questionable insurance acts. Two of the attorneys in the division have been granted the status of "Special Assistant to the Attorney General" which gives the Division the opportunity to expedite investigations and make

Since May of 2004, KID has inof loss. The report also includes a vestigated 180 reports of fraud resulting in 7 cases prosecuted, with all 7 resulting in conviction. Six of those cases were prosecuted by the Anti-Fraud Division and one case was prosecuted by the United States Attorney's Office. To date, in 2005, the KID Anti-Fraud Division has opened 24 cases and referred 6 cases to other agencies or federal law enforcement for investigation.

> If you are considering purchasing a policy from a new insurance company, one thing you can personally do to help put a stop to insurance fraud is to stop, and call the Kansas Insurance Department to confirm if the company you are considering is licensed to do business in the state of Kansas.
