Poison prevention week during March

National Poison Prevention Week is in March. This is a good time to evaluate your knowledge of poison and the safety of your home

Even if you don't have children in the home, you never know when they might visit.

 $As \, adults, you \, should \, never \, refer$ to vitamins or medicine as "candy" because they are often colorful and attractive to kids. FYI: the most common childhood poison is ironfortified vitamin overdose

Try not to take medicine in front of children, they will play-act like adults. Always store food products and household cleaning products in separate cabinets or areas. Always ask for child-resistant containers for medicines, buy over-the-counter medicines and cleaning products in tamper-proof packaging when pos-

Keep your poison control hotline number on or near all phones (1-800-332-6633). Keep all products and medicines in their original containers. Many plants are poisonous to children or pets. Check with poison control to confirm which are

Keep potentially harmful common household products locked and out of reach of children and

Always buy children's art products which are labeled "non-toxic" or safe for kids. Never set down a product, even for a minute, when distracted. Many poisonings happen when a product is being used and an adult leaves it unattended "for a minute" to answer a phone or the doorbell.

A poison is anything that can be eaten, breathed in or absorbed in the skin or eyes that can cause sickness or death. Poisons come in all forms

The men's barbershop quartet, Lasting Impressions, will join them in this show suitable for all ages. dies' quartet, Prairie Chicks.



Common household poisons include personal care products including cosmetics, doctor-prescribed medicines, over-thecounter medicines, iron-fortified vitamins, batteries, laundry products, plants, pesticides, alcohol, mouthwash, antifreeze, cigarettes, windshield washer solution, carbon monoxide most commonly breathed in as car exhaust fumes, lighter fluid, paint chips containing lead or poisonous mushrooms. It is not recommended anymore to use syrup of ipecac or activated charcoal. Your poison control center will guide you as to what to do with accidental poisonings, make this your first call.

Child supervision is the most important aspect for preventing accidental poisonings. Keeping your home childproof is another safety step. By keeping your purse put in a place where it is not accessible children.

When performing household chores, NEVER leave a household product out, unsupervised even for

or doorbell. It only takes an unsupervised second for a child to eat or drink a poison left out in the open.

The symptoms of poisoning include the following: a child cannot focus or "follow" with their eyes, their eyes roll in circles, the child loses consciousness, the child becomes sleepy before normal bedtime or naptime, their lips or skin around or in their mouth have stains or burns on them, the child breathes with difficulty/labored breathing or you can smell a substance on the child's breath. What steps would you take if a

child has been poisoned? Do not panic. Many patients can be successfully treated at home with guidance from a doctor or nurse at the poison control center emergency hotline. If the child is unconscious

a minute while answering a phone or unresponsive, call 911 as soon as possible. If the child is conscious, follow these instructions depending on the method of poisoning — Inhaled poison: Get the child to fresh air immediately, avoid breathing fumes, open all windows and doors fully and call poison control. Poison on skin: Remove any affected clothing, rinse skin continuously with water for five minutes, wash skin gently with soap and water then repeat, call poison control. Poison in the eye: Rinse the affected eye with lukewarm water for five to 10 minutes, have the child blink as much as possible while rinsing, do not force the eyelid open, call poison control. Swallowed poison: Immediately call poison control. The trained specialists are available anytime, day or night, to talk you through your emergency.


