Colby Community College The Colby Community College Trojan wrestlers' season recently culminated in a fourth-place finish at the national tournament in Rochester, Minn This was an amazing feat for the Trojans who started the season unranked as a team, and entered the nationals ranked fourth in the country. They did all this with a core group of wrestlers from northwest Kansas.

The team was led by Eric Luedke of Colby, who won his second national title. He won a national title his freshman season at 157 pounds. This season he won the 165 pound title. He was ranked number one in the country from start to finish. He is only the third wrestler in the long history of Colby College wrestling to win back to back national titles.

### Academic honors go to three teams


Three Colby Community College athletic teams have been honored by the NJCAA as fall academic teams-of-the-year.
