children Devlin in 1983, Brett in 1985 and Carleigh in 1988. Chuck, an extremely devoted husband and father, always wanted to be available for his wife and children. He coached Devlin and Brett in T-ball, was their Cub Scout leader and a parent sponsor on many of the school trips during the kid's grade school and middle school years. Chuck was the children's biggest sports fan and was proud of the fact that he never missed any sports events that his children were involved in. Even when his health was failing he attended every game that the CHS drill team performed at to see his daughter Carleigh dance.
