D. Lee Hull, 90, of Woodston, died Wednesday, April 27, 2005 at Hays Medical Center. He had served as the superintendent of schools in Levant at one time.

He was born Downer Lee Hull on Oct. 2, 1915 to Abram Downer and Elsie May (Thomas) Hull in Ash Rock Township in Rooks County. He attended rural elementary school at Fairplay in Osborne County and Spring Branch in Ash Rock Township. He graduated from Woodston Rural High School in 1934.In 1938 he graduated from Fort Hays State College where he met his wife, Kelly Hull. They were married at her home in Phillipsburg on Aug. 21, 1937 by her father, Judge Fred Kelly and his father, Downer Hull.

Mr. Hull worked in school administration and teaching after college. In 1962 he received his Masters degree in education and school administration from Fort Hays and he served as a teacher or superintendent in schools in the region until he retired from teaching in 1978. He also farmed.

In 1949, the family moved to a farm near Woodston. In 1961, they moved into a house in Ash Rock Township and later formed a farming partnership with his son Tom.

After retiring from teaching, he pursued a long-time interest in photography and joined his wife in exhibits and art shows. He also had an interest in history and served on a panel and later was founder and president of the project to restore Thomas Barn, built by his grandfather. Mr. Hull enjoyed music and singing and performed in quartets, choral groups and a barbershop group in Hays. He was also a member of Woodston United Methodist Church for more than 40 years, serving on the ministerial council and taught Sunday school classes.

Mr. Hull is survived by one son, Thomas Kelly Hull of Woodston; two daughters, Helen Leane Hitchcock of St. Louis, Mo. and Connie Lee Hull of Woodston; a brother, Laurence Hull of Woodston; six grandchildren; six great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Kelly; two sisters, Frances VanGundy and Lucille Stanfield and two grandsons.

Services will be at 11 a.m. Monday at Stockton United Methodist Church with Rev. Herman Lambrecht and Rev. Lyle Miller officiating. Burial will be at Spring Branch Cemetery in rural Woodston
