Sentencing set for DUI repeater

OAKLEY — An Oakley man, Harry L. Roudebush, 69, was arraigned in Logan County District Court on Thursday for driving under the influence of alcohol on April 25, his third such offense.

Roudebush waived his rights to a trial and pleaded guilty before District Judge Glenn Schiffner.

"They stopped me for driving under the influence. I had one can of beer and it showed I was drinking," Roudebush told the judge.

Schiffner accepted Roudebush's guilty plea and told him since it was his third conviction he faces 90days in jail and a fine between \$1,500 and \$2,500. He said after a mandatory sentence of 48 consecutive hours in jail, he could apply for a house arrest or work release program. He also told Roudebush he'd be required to complete an alcohol treatment program to be approved by the court.

Attorney Charles Stewart told Schiffner his client had undergone an alcohol evaluation about a month ago, and asked if the outcome of that evaluation would suffice. Schiffner

Roudebush will remain out of jail on a recognizance bond until he is sentenced at 10 a.m. on Aug. 4.
