Setting the record straight

To the Colby Free Press:

The article on page 5 of Friday's Free Press entitled United Church of Christ could change has prompted no small amount of questioning for me and other members of the Church of Christ in Colby concerning our stance on homosexuality and the Bible.

First, the United Church of Christ and the Church of Christ are different entities. The United Church of Christ claims denominational status and apparently has some sort of annual meeting in which doctrinal concerns are aired and decided.

The Church of Christ is, on the other hand, the fellowship of all who have, by faith, accepted the grace of God and been immersed into Christ.

Because we have no rule other than the Bible, no authority outside of scripture and no earthly organization outside of the local congregation, we cannot say what "our church" believes. We can only repeat what the Bible says.

Second, we are commanded by scripture to love all humanity. In fact, the preaching of the gospel, which includes humanity's need for the savior because of sin, is done out of the love of God who desires all people to be saved and sent Jesus so that salvation could be possible.

The Lord himself explained that his mission was not to the healthy, but to the sick. Those who do not understand themselves to be sinners can never understand their need for a savior.

Third, scripture is clear in its description of homosexuality as a sin. So are lying, greed and envy. Each of those requires repentance - which includes the willingness to reform — in order to receive

While certain sins may be worse according to human understanding because of their effect on society, no sin will be better or worse in God's eyes at the final judgment. All will either be forgiven or condemned based solely on our response to Jesus. Finally, no sin is unforgivable. God is able to forgive any sin so

long as the sinner comes to Him through Christ and in true penitence. As such, our doors are open to any who wish to have such a relationship.

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
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Things you need to know about July
