Hunt for body

Colby Free Press It was almost like a scene out

of a movie. But it was reality.

Reports of a possible body in the waters of Villa High Lake in Colby brought rescue people, investigators, police, sheriff and curious onlookers to the scene this morning.

Gary Shull, an investigator with the Colby Police Department, said at about 11 p.m. Thursday night police received a call of a man missing in the lake. They then called out the Colby Fire Department's search and rescue squad to investigate.

He said the individual reported in the water was last seen with a couple of friends Thursday night at the lake site.

The man went into the water and after several minutes his friends saw his hat but couldn't see him. Shull said they searched for about 20 minutes before calling the police.

The search and rescue squad searched the park until 2 a.m., Shull said. Someone did stay until daylight when search ef-

forts resumed. Officers were using a probe evening before the body rises to the

He said the search was taking so long because when someone drowns, their body drops to the bot-

Depending on the stomach contents, Shull said it can take several hours for a body to surface. He said it could be late this afternoon or

The victim was not identified.

They made their own drag while waiting for the Scott County equipment to arrive, which did shortly after noon. Colby authorities met the Scott City authorities mid-way between the two cities to exchange the equipment.

Both exits to the park were closed this morning while law enforcement searched the lake.

Shull said they have received assistance from city crews whO have helped, the fire department, Thomas County Sheriff's Office and Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks.
