An 18-year-old Goodland man was sentenced in Thomas County District Court on Wednesday.

Matson Z. Hatfield pleaded guilty to possession of a narcotic drug at his last court appearance on Thursdays, Aug. 3. Hatfield was arrested in Thomas County on Tuesday, June 20, for possession of methamphetamine.

On Wednesday, Hatfield's attorney, Bruce Flipse, Colby, told the judge his client had been a "total gentleman" to work with.

"He has stayed in contact with me and I haven't had any problem with him," Flipse told District Judge Glenn Schiffner when asking for probation for his client.

Schiffner sentenced Hatfield to standard probation of 12 months with an underlying prison sentence of 12 months if he violates proba-

Hatfield will have to complete a drug treatment program, pay courts just under \$1,200, bear no firearms for at least five years and submit blood and saliva samples to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation within 10 days.

Colby man gets 'second chance'

District Judge Glenn Schiffner told Dale A. Quast he would grant him an 18-month probation and 24month post-release probation rather then sending him to prison.

While under oath, Quast's attorney, Scott Showalter, Goodland, asked if he understood the seriousness of his situation.

"You understand you are on the last rung of the ladder being in this border box, correct?" he asked referring to the state's sentencing guidelīnes.

"Yes sir," Quast said.

Quast on Aug. 26 pleaded guilty to the felony charge of possession of marijuana with intent to sell and the misdemeanor charge of disorderly conduct. Originally charged with possession of methamphetamine with intent to sell within 1,000 feet of a school, sale of methamphetamine, conspiracy to commit sale of a stimulant, possession of a hallucinogenic drug, possession of drug paraphernalia with intent to sell or distribute, no drug tax stamp, possession of drug paraphernalia and fleeing or attempting to elude a police officer. 


