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
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
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## We need to help one another

My children's dad was in the military and we were stationed in Germany at the height of the Iran hostage crisis. As a military dependent, I was trained how to get my children to a safe haven evacuation point in the happenstance we had to quickly return to the United States.

I can empathize with Lori's comments that it is sometimes difficult to keep the mission as the first priority, setting one's spouse as second and do things alone.

Like Lori, I lived months on end without a spouse as the 24/7 caregiver for minor children. And like Lori, it saddens me that we have Americans out and about who don't support our nation's leaders, particularly President Bush, and the military personnel. likes of Saddam Hussein.
