# **Probation revoked on teenager with 50 crimes**


"This hammer is clearly resting over his head," Showalter said. Schiffner disagreed.

"You were charged with 52 counts and got 51 of them dropped. That would appear to me that was a tremendous break. I'm basically shocked you took it so lightly," Schiffner said. In an affidavit on file with the court clerk's office, Organ said Jones violated his probation on more than one occasion. She said Jones admitted to having missed appointments with his probation officer, didn't return to Hays on time after visiting his family in Colby, had alcohol at his home in Hays, lied about being employed, missed curfew, and failed to make restitution payments.

"If you fail to complete Labette Boot Camp or come home and do not complete the term of the sentence the penitentiary is the next step," Schiffner said.

Jones' sentence to Labette Boot Camp will be for a period of six months.
