Three area school districts discuss Jennings, tax dollars

School districts in Hoxie, Oberlin and Norton look to keep thousands in tax dollars with the dissolution of the district in Jennings next year. Money in the past which was sent

out of Sheridan, Decatur and Norton Counties will stay in each county starting next school year. "What we collected in 2004 for

the Jennings School District spending in 2005 was \$93,198 for the state general levy at 20 mills and the rest is \$74,037," said Marilyn Horn, Decatur County Clerk.

Sheridan County Clerk Paula Bielser said her county's figures are higher than her counterparts'.

"We collected \$100,421 for the state general levy at 20 mills, and \$105,439 for the rest at 14.964 mills," she said of money previ-

ously going to the Jennings School District.

At the Aug. 8 school board meeting in Jennings, board members Lawrence Carter, Frances Bader, Gary Gillum, Jeanette Krizek, Alesha Vahlin and Lila Jennings voted 5-2 on how to distribute land owned by the district when it's dissolved at the end of this school year. Jerry McKenna was appointed to an open seat later in the meeting.

The land distribution is what will change how much taxpayer dollars will remain in each county.

"It appears the total sections (of land) to be given to the Oberlin School District is 102 sections, while Hoxie School District will

receive 93 sections," Horn said. pretty evenly split between the two
