LAWRENCE (AP) — University of Kansas professor Chip Taylor walks through the butterfly garden behind Foley Hall on West Campus, looking closely at the cosmos, parsley, purple coneflower and milkweed plants for signs of monarch larvae or pupae.

Nearby a female monarch feeds on an ageratum.

"This will be a good year for migration," said Taylor, explaining the rain in August extended the blooming season of the flowers that produce the nectar attractive to monarch butterflies.

"What we see here really depends on the conditions in Texas," he said. "If it's good there, then they migrate up here. Ten to 12 species come in from Texas and reestablish their population here."

Taylor, director of Monarch Watch and professor of ecology and evolutionary biology, has started a national effort to create 10,000 "monarch waystations" over the next three years to help preserve the dwindling numbers of monarch butterflies in the United States.

"The idea is to get everyone who is interested in the monarch butterfly and those interested in gardening to create monarch habitats," he said.

The waystation name harkens back to the 19th century, during the




