# **Emporia senator jumps into race for governor**

Jim Barnett, of Emporia, announced Thursday that he intends to run for the right to challenge Democratic Gov. Kathleen who has been a perennial candidate Sebelius. The 51-year-old Barnett for state and federal office. was first elected to the Senate in

2000 and re-elected last year. "One of the difficult balancing acts for Jim is going to be navigating the division within the Republican Party," said Senate Majority Leader Derek Schmidt, R-Independence. "Jim has the ability to appeal to both factions, but sustaining that will be very, very hard."
