that needed their help.

After their first visit, all they talked about was what they could do for Hoxie, Oakley and Colby.

"They identified the needs and put that first and that's what drew them to the opportunity," Focke said.

Joe Stratton, administrator in Hoxie, is excited about this new concept for attracting doctors.

"I equate this out-of-the-box thinking and sharing of resources as equal to school consolidation," Stratton said.

"You consolidate so you can keep your school, and you can call anyone in my position, and we are deal-

ing with the same thing." Stratton said regardless of where Dr. John France lives he'll be in

Hoxie one-half of the time. Sheridan County Health Complex on a full-time basis rents an

apartment at Sheridan Estates and it is used by visiting doctors and nurse practitioners who are on call. Dr. John France will occupy the

apartment two weeks each month. He will share his on-call time with Dr. Bruce Kellogg, Colby, and nurse practitioners Kaylee Watkins, Hoxie, and Jenny Niblock, Colby, as well as visiting doctors employed by Olathe-based Docs Who Care.

Stratton said for some time now the Hoxie facility has provided specialty clinics and having Drs. Ratchnee and John France on board will be yet another asset.

"The doctors both have decades of experience with the United States Army and we are getting a podiatrist to live in the area and a doctor who will be strong for this area," he said.

On Monday, Commissioners Ron Schamberger, Keith Kennedy and David Zimmerman were asked about their intent in addressing the need for an elevator.

"It's too expensive," Kennedy immediately snapped.

"He said it was his understanding installing an elevator in the courthouse would cost close to \$1 million

"It's an ongoing problem," Schamberger said about not complying with the Disabilities Act for the past 13 years.

Phone not enough

"I do believe not having an elevator denies access to justice to the public, particularly to the disabled and elderly," Schiffner said on Tuesday. "I'm concerned if we had a jury trial what we'd do."

The judge believes the quality of court proceedings are diminished when conducted outside of the courtroom.

"To use a facility without the courtroom is not fair to the litigants. There's something about a courtroom that demands a certain respect. To use a room with a flat floor with the jury sitting on folding chairs just doesn't' demand the same respect a courtroom does," Schiffner said.

Brian Atwell, director of Living Independently in Northwest Kansas, Hays, said numerous agencies over the years have tried to work with Sheridan County officials regarding elevator installation.

"Idon't know why it hasn't come down to being done," Atwell said.

Atwell said in the instance of John Bergman, a title researcher from Colorado who was injured when he fell down the courthouse stairs in September, a phone system for access to the second and third floor isn't enough compliance with first floor of the courtroom when the Americans with Disabilities
