

# Voice of Royals speaks at Colby Rotary

White said the Glass family plans to increase the team's payroll for 2006, which may attract more talented players to Kansas City. Although the projected \$50 million payroll for 2006 lags behind league leaders New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox, White said the recent parity in Major League Baseball has been good for the game.

"We have had six different World Series winners," he said. "But salaries are still a concern. When I started nobody talked about pay-

The Yankees deep pockets have acquired many talented players. Although Major League Baseball has made financial changes to improve team competitiveness, White said there is still disparity in the
