## Salvation Army holiday campaign ready to begin

The Thomas County Salvation Army raises and distributes funds which go direct to local emergency assistance. The types of assistance available to the community throughout the year are: funds for assistance with utilities (gas, electric, propane), funds for rent/lodging, prescriptions/medical, food, gasoline, Vision USA, League of Mercy and Kids Camp.

The Vision USA is a cooperative program between the State Optometric Association and the Salvation Army. If a person qualifies, they receive an eye exam and glasses if needed. The League of Mercy distributes gifts to nursing home residents annually at Christmas time. Kids Camp is an annual event in which an underprivileged child can attend a two- to three-day camp. In the past, Thomas County Salvation Army has also provided fans for those who were on limited income. All of these activities come out of

the local budget.

In Thomas County, in past Christmas seasons, these funds have been raised through the Red Kettle Campaign. In 2004, and again this year, the Salvation Army will seek to raise funds by having inserts placed in a local mailing. All moneys collected in local fund-raising are deposited in a local account. Later, this money is transferred to Divisional Headquarters in Kansas City, Mo. for posting. This amount is then credited to the county of origin and included in their annual budget.

The 2005 campaign will start on Nov. 19 and end on Dec. 24. Anyone wishing to contribute may mail their contributions to the Thomas County Sheriff's Office, c/o Salvation Army, 225 N. Court Ave., Colby, Kan., 67701. The more money raised locally, the more financial assistance can be provided to the community throughout the year.

MANHATTAN — Anyone — including students at college — can be vulnerable to identity theft, said Carol Young, Kansas State University Research and Extension family financial management specialist.

Americans need to be cautious about identity theft and know how to protect themselves, she said.

To reduce the risks, "Go over

your bills and bank statements carefully every month to make sure that there is nothing suspicious," Young said. "Track your spending so that you can know when items you didn't buy are being charged to your account."
