Council (NCPC) warns taxpayers that they have more to worry about than owing money to the identity thieves posing as the IRS to steal personal information.

ment have reported an increase in which fraudulent spammers send e-mails that use the IRS logo in an effort to dupe taxpayers into providing such personal information as their Social Security number. The e-mails soliciting personal information may look real, coming from such addresses as "tax-refunds@irs.gov" or "admin@irs.gov", but, in fact, they redirect the responses to scammers.
