Colorado man faces DUI charge

A Colorado man was charged with driving drunk in Thomas County in May.

Dallas C. Reeder, 34, of Lafayette, Colo., was arrested for allegedly driving under the influence of alcohol for a third time about midnight May 9.

Reeder was stopped by a Thomas County Sheriff's deputy at the intersection of Kansas Highway 25 and Interstate 70. If convicted and depending on a presentence investigation, Reeder faces up to one year in the county jail on the DUI charge.

He was also charged with driving on a suspended or revoked license,

Reeder faces six months in the county jail and a fine up to \$100,000, as well as an additional month and fine up to \$500 for transporting an open container.

Reeder made his first appearance in court May 11 and has bonded out of jail.
