
Weather Corner

Colorado man pleads on drug case


A Colorado man was sentenced in Thomas County District Court on Wednesday for a drug arrest last

Patrick McNeal, age unknown, of Denver pleaded guilty in April to possession of marijuana with the intent of selling it in Colby on June 25 and July 22, 2005.

According to court documents, District Judge Glenn Schiffner sentenced McNeal to an underlying prison term of 18 months and then granted him probation with community corrections for 18 months. McNeal will also serve a postrelease probation of 24 months and pay \$1,402 in court costs, attorney fees and Kansas Bureau of Investigation lab fees.

McNeal will not be allowed to own a firearm for a period of five years and was ordered to submit blood and saliva samples to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation within 10 days.

Schiffner also ordered McNeal to obtain drug treatment as a way to reduce the risk of offender recidivism and is allowing him to serve out the terms of his probation in Colorado.

On a second count of transporting an open container, Dodd was fined \$200 and sentenced to an underlying jail term of six months and placed on probation which will run concurrent to the County Sheriff Mike Baughn then
