Kansas offers incentives to improve kids' routes to school

The Kansas Department of Transportation is looking for applications for Safe Routes to Schools Projects.

"This federally funded program will provide 100 percent reimbursements to cities, counties, school districts, and other entities to provide infrastructural and non-infrastructural improvements that encourage children to walk or bicycle to school more safely," said Lisa Koch, coordinating the project.

Three types of funding options are available.

The first option, she said, is a Phase 1 program that will provide reimbursements for school district-local public authority collaborations to create a *Safe Routes* to School Plan.

"This plan will identify areas in need of engineering improvements and will identify what type of education, enforcement, and evalua- School Plan are eligible for this tion programs would work best, Koch said.

The second option is a Phase 2 Infrastructure project. School district-local public authority collaborations that currently have a *Safe Routes to School Plan* are eligible school districts for submitting for this program.

The third option is the Phase 2 non-infrastructure program.

Demand for mental health services climbing at colleges

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) -Nearly half of all college students suffer some degree of depression, experts say, and college counseling specialists in Missouri and Kansas are having a hard time keeping up with demand for their services.

"It is a crisis because it has mushroomed on the campuses more rapidly than we were totally prepared for," said Marita Barkis, director of the counseling center at the University of Missouri-Kansas City.

The American Medical Association is calling for increased mental health services on college campuses to address the issue.

"Existing campus counseling and health services are often overburdened due to inadequate resources as severe mental health conditions increase among students,"AMAboard member J. James Rohack said in a news release.

Counselors say students are under growing pressure to perform so they can get higher-paying jobs; many who have never experienced failure suffer their first setbacks in college; and some students whose mental illness prevented them from attending college before are being allowed in because of advances in medicines to treat their problems.

"Stress is a big factor," Barkis said. "There is a lot of pressure on young people, high expectations and it is very competitive."

Richard Kadison, chief of mental health services at Harvard University, said people need to be more aware than nearly one in two college students will suffer from depression at some point while in school.

"Parents, faculty and students need to be educated and promote healthier lifestyles," he said. "College administrators are missing the point on how important it is to have adequate resources to help students stay healthy."

A study three years ago at Kansas State University found that the number of students seeing school counselors for depression had doubled number of students with suicidal thoughts had tripled over that same

"Think about how competitive and organized all children have become from a very early age with sports and everything - get this experience, get that experience, things that used to be free play are now structured and high stakes," Barkis said. "When we played stickball in the street, if you struck out, so what, it was just for fun. Not anymore.'

Sherry Benton, assistant director of the counseling center at Kansas State, said mechanisms need to be put into place so that students are able to afford treatment for mental issues.

"One really useful thing to do would be to require students to have health insurance so that it can be fac-
