High wheat quality may offset flour prices

WICHITA (AP) — The extraor- from harvests in Texas, Oklahoma Plains states may help offset the nation's hard red winter wheat crop, high cost of flour for millers and the preliminary composite data is crop prices for drought-plagued growers this season, preliminary data shows.

Results compiled from harvests in Kansas, Texas and Oklahoma show the quality of the hard red winter wheat crop is so high that flour mills will be able to offset shortages of the crop by combining millers will be able to use more of it with other, more plentiful wheat types, said Mike Woolverton, a grain marketing economist at Kansas State University. "To me, this is the good news in

this really tough year for wheat producers," he said. "In many places, yield was way down, but the quality of this was for an exceptional wheat crop to come in many years. This is the bright spot."

The results from the winter wheat harvest in the Southern Plains mean those growers will likely receive premium prices for their crop. "This will allow millers to use soft red winter wheat — which is in abundant supply this year - and blend flours together to come up with an acceptable level for bakers," Woolverton said.


