# Sheridan County employees no longer use credit cards

Sheridan County employees no longer have credit cards to use for out of town meetings or emergencies.

County Clerk Paula Bielser on Tuesday said she was told by Commissioners David Zimmerman, Ron Schamberger and Keith Kennedy county employees could no longer use credit cards she had ordered.

Bielser ordered credit cards as a way to reduce paperwork and out of pocket expenses when employees travel to meetings requiring meals and lodging.
