Both men are charged with one count of minor in possession for having alcohol and being under age 21. A Class C misdemeanor, if convicted of the charge they face one month in the county jail and a fine

Mardock is charged with driving under the influence of alcohol for a second time. A Class A nonperson misdemeanor, if convicted he faces one year in the county jail and a fine up to \$2,500 for this single count of which Runnalls was not charged.

Mardock and Runnalls each were released on a \$50,000 bond. Runnalls is being supervised by court services.


