Dear Dr. Brothers: I have a problem that might sound funny, but it's really causing me to worry about myself. ## Grant assists with district

Since its inception, the committee meets once a month during the school year. In 2003, the district was one of the benefactors of a federal grant, called Project Achievement, administered by Emporia State University.

"Under the terms of the grant, USD 316 educators had 15 semester hours of ESL work provided free-of-charge, as well as all their textbooks and fees," Baskerville said.

He, along with Sally Jones, Title I instructor, were the first Golden Plains' educators to complete their ESL endorsements under the terms of the grant. Since 2004, Julie Ziegelmeier, fifth grade instructor; Margaret Houtz, middle school language arts' teacher; and Traci Uehlin, high school mathematics

instructor, have completed their endorsements.

Baskerville said because of the growing Hispanic population in Rexford, over the past seven school years the Golden Plains' district and community-wide organizations have hosted Cinco de Mayo celebrations for the minority population.

In addition, the district has developed a parents' and patrons' computer facility that is available for technology usage and instruction during the school day.

"Minority adults, as well as non-minority citizens, are free to utilize the room whenever school is in session at Golden Plains," Baskerville said. "During the summer months, specific evenings are set aside for all the district's adults to work on their computer and English and Spanish skills."

## School projects sparks Nobel nomination

PITTSBURG (AP) — A high school project to tell the story of a Polish woman who saved thousands of children during the Holocaust has earned the woman a Nobel Peace Prize nomination.

In 1999, a teacher at Uniontown High School suggested that four students research the facts behind the life of Irena Sendler, who is credited with saving 2,500 Jewish children from the Warsaw ghetto in 1942-43.

Now, teacher Norm Conard and others are working with the presi-

dent of Poland and the prime minister of Israel on Sendler's nomination for the Nobel Peace Prize.

"Of course, a nomination for the Nobel Peace Prize is a long way from receiving it," Conard said. "But I was just telling someone today, the project has gone leaps and bounds above what any of us could have imagined."

The nomination is the latest step for Conard and the students, whose project grew to include a short play called "Life in a Jar," that depicted Sendler's story. The students pre-

sented the play hundreds of times and traveled to Poland to meet Sendler. The project was the subject of a documentary and has garnered international recognition for Sendler and the students.

"It has touched the hearts of so many people," Conard said. "It's a testimony to not only Irena Sendler, and the courageous acts that she completed, but also to a bunch of dedicated young people passionate about making a difference in the world."

It began when Megan Stewart,

Elizabeth Cambers, Jessica Shelton and Sabrina Coons entered their project in the National History Day program in 1999.

Megan Stewart — now Megan Felt — said when they started, the students found only two Web sites with information about Sendler. They sent a letter to Sendler and received one back a few months later.

In February, the Milken Family Foundation plans to make a DVD of "Life in a Jar" to distribute for educational purposes.
