The Eagles struggled to make perimeter shots. Colby only made two of their 17 shots from the threepoint line.

"We couldn't put the ball in the hoop or hit outside shots," said Colby coach Beau Sheets. The Eagles struggled with their shooting, only making 18-48 field shots.


The Lady Eagles shot an outstanding 13-14 free throw shots for 93 percent. Spreading the point production across four players kept Rawlins County's defense guessing.

"We were very well balanced in scoring and that is nice to see. We had four girls in double figures," said Colby coach Derek Bissitt.

The Lady Eagles proved to be strongest during the third quarter. Colby kept with the strategy that has been working for them all season: the full-court press.

"We made some adjustments at halftime and we did a good job in the third quarter. We built a 26-point lead," said Bissitt.

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
