"The new construction is going to be for four double rooms and four single rooms," Reed said.

The commissioners approved a dollar figure up to \$575,000, the difference in the two figures being used for equipment and furnishings. Glen Strait, Strait Associates of Colby, is the architect and Rhoads Construction of Goodland is the general contractor. Farmers State Bank of Oakley will finance the project at 5.35 percent for 10 years.
